PRESIDENT'S REPORT for 2015 - 2016

It gives me much pleasure to present to you the Alexandra & District Dog Obedience Club Inc Annual Report for 2015 -2016. This is a very special year for us, as 2015 – 2016 sees our club celebrating 25 years of providing Obedience classes for the dog owners of Alexandra and the surrounding District.

2015-2016 has also been a year in which ADDOC has continued to make excellent progress. Membership numbers have risen steadily each month and are currently at an all time high. There are now 7 Instructors volunteering their time to conduct classes.

The new Obedience Program, introduced in February 2015, has proven to be very successful. Since its introduction we have had a record number of Puppies and Older Dogs graduate from the Kinder class with a satisfying number of these graduates continuing on to complete the Family Companion Certificate Class. In our Advanced A & B Classes we also have a wonderful group of handlers and dogs enjoying the extra challenges at this higher level.

Rally Obedience and Agility classes are still available on the 4th Sunday of each month and are received with enthusiasm! Tracking classes started off well but have lapsed since our Instructor became unable to continue due to ill health. Thankfully she is on the road to recovery and the possibility of restarting the Tracking Program will be investigated when the time is right.

The club has continued to take every opportunity to showcase the talents of our handlers and their dogs. We always receive terrific support from members when we ask for volunteers for our display teams. Congratulations to all of you as it can be truly nerve wracking to perform in Public!

Public Appearances for 2015 -2016:

- Walk through the town. In August, before the Annual General Meeting, a large number of members and dogs arrived at 10am and went for a very cold and foggy group walk down the main street of Alexandra.
- Yea Community Market. In October, there was an excellent turnout on a beautiful sunny day in Yea which enabled the demonstration to include exercises from all sections of the Training Program, from Kinder right through to Advanced Level.
- Alexandra Show. In November, members from the Advanced A & B Demonstration Team
 really shone while displaying the talents of their dogs. They looked fantastic and were loudly
 applauded by the large audience.
- RSPCA Million Paws Walk. The weather was kind and on another beautiful Autumn morning
 the club put on an Obedience Demonstration with handlers and dogs from Kinder Level
 through to Advanced Level showing what they could do. Everyone then enjoyed their walk
 around the Pondage and the sausage sizzle afterwards.
- Visit to the Country Women's Association. In May 2016, 3 members and their dogs attended a CWA meeting where we gave a short talk on how to choose the right dog for your family. We did a very brief obedience demonstration and answered lots of questions.

place in the different games and activities!!!! Winners are grinners! and sometimes enthusiasm was more important than skill!! This was followed by a delicious, very welcome, barbeque lunch. We finished off the day with our World Famous Sausage Race.

Our 2nd Fun Day in May this year was another very enjoyable social occasion for all members of the Club. In spite of the weather, which was miserable, everyone enjoyed themselves.
